A Level Philosophy and Ethics



Philosophy and ethics is a broad essay based subject which gives you a range of knowledge and understanding of many philosophical concepts, key thinkers, themes, texts and ways of thinking. It also draws light on key ethical issues which remain incredibly important to this day, such as cloning, abortion and animal testing. During your studies you will cover many theories and study the works of many key philosophers and thinkers, from Plato to Aristotle, to Kant and Freud. The content covered is very varied and interesting and will offer a new perspective and encourage you to consider things from an analytic and challenging perspective. It will give you a new view on the key issues which face modern society today. The subject will also leave you with many transferrable skills which will be very useful not only for your future studies but in your everyday life and in how you approach situations and problems with which you are faced. Such as analysing and evaluating the arguments of others, whilst constructing and defending your own arguments.

The subject is widely recognised by universities and can work well with both humanities and written subjects such as history and English, as well as alongside sciences and mathematical subjects.

Paper 1: Epistemology and Moral Philosophy	Written exam: 3 hours
Epistemology is the study of knowledge — within this topic students will study a range of theories	100 marks
on how we can justify the knowledge we have as well as ideas about the variation of perception.	50% of A-level
Moral Philosophy (ethics) looks at the meaning of good and bad — students will look at the theories	
of utilitarianism, Kantian deontological ethics and Aristotelian virtue ethics. Students will also need	
to apply these theories to world issues such as stealing, simulated killing (video games) and lying.	
Students will explore and analyse the origins of human principles including reason, emotions and	
society.	
Paper 2: Metaphysics of God and Metaphysics of Mind	Written exam: 3 hours
Metaphysics of God is the analysis of the arguments relating to the existence of God. This unit is	100 marks
studied from a secular view point and students will study the theories of St. Anslem, Descartes and	50% of A-level
Hume. The nature or moral of natural evil is also studied along with Plantinga's free will defence and John Hick's soul-making theory.	
Metaphysics of Mind is the exploration of the human understanding of 'mind'. Students will study	
theories relating to different mental states and idea of intentionality and identity. They will analyse	
Descartes theory of dualism and evaluate contemporary challenges to his ideas. Students will also	
study the theories of physicalism and functionalism.
